



. She is by nature the Daughter of Adam, who by her sinlessness undid the sin of Eve. She is by faith the True child of Abraham, who first believed and so conceived. She is by descent the Branch from the root of Jesse, bearing the flower that is Jesus Christ our Lord.

In celebrating the mystery of Christ, the Church also frequently and with deep reverence honours the Blessed Virgin Mary, because of her close bonds with her Son. She is revered by the Church as the new Eve, who, in view of the death of her Son, received at the moment of her conception a higher form of redemption. She is revered as mother, who through the power of the Holy Spirit gave virginal birth to her Son. She is revered as the disciple of Christ, who treasured in her heart the words of Christ the Master. She is revered as the faithful companion of the Redeemer, who, as God had planned, devoted herself with selfless generosity to her Son's mission. The Church also sees in the Blessed Virgin a preeminent and unique member, graced with all virtue.

The Church lovingly cherishes her and never ceases to ask for her protection, for she is the Mother entrusted to us by Christ on the altar of the Cross. The Church proclaims Mary as companion and sister in the journeyof faith and in the adversities of life. In Mary, ENTHRONED AT CHRIST'S SIDE IN THE KINGDOM OF HEAVEN, THE CHURCH JOYFULLY CON-TEMPLATES THE IMAGE OF ITS OWN FUTURE GLORY

From the Catechism of the Catholic Church

MARY - MOTHER OF CHRIST, MOTHER OF THE CHURCH

I. MARY'S MOTHERHOOD WITH REGARD TO THE CHURCH:

... Wholly united with her Son

"Mary's role in the Church is inseparable from her union with Christ and flows directly from it. "This union of the mother with the Son in the work of salvation is made manifest from the time of Christ's virginal conception up to his death";⁵⁰⁴ it is made manifest above all at the hour of his Passion: " Thus the Blessed Virgin advanced in her pilgrimage of faith, and faithfully persevered in her union with her Son unto the cross. There she stood, in keeping with the divine plan, enduring with her only begotten Son the intensity of his suffering, joining herself with his sacrifice in her mother's heart, and lovingly consenting to the immolation of this victim, born of her: to be given, by the same Christ Jesus dying on the cross, as a mother to his disciple, with these words: "Woman, behold your

"After her Son's Ascension, Mary "aided the beginnings of the Church by her prayers." 506 In her association with the apostles and several women, "we also see Mary by her prayers imploring the gift of the Spirit, who had already overshadowed her in the Annunciation."

... also in her Assumption

"Finally the Immaculate Virgin, preserved free from all stain of original sin, when the course of her earthly life was finished, was taken up body and soul into heavenly glory, and exalted by the Lord as Queen over all things, so that she might be the more fully conformed to her Son, the Lord of lords and conqueror of sin and death."508 The Assumption of the Blessed Virgin is a singular participation in her Son's Resurrection and an anticipation of the resurrection of other Christians "

In giving birth you kept your virginity; in your Dormition you did not leave the world, O Mother of God, but were joined to the source of Life. You conceived the living God and, by your prayers, will deliver our souls from death. 505

... She is our Mother in the order of grace...

"By her complete adherence to the Father's will, to his Son's redemptive work, and to every prompting of the Holy Spirit, the Virgin Mary is the Church's model of faith and charity. Thus she is a "preeminent and . . . wholly unique member of the Church"; indeed, she is the "exemplary realization" (typus) ⁵¹⁰ of the Church. Her role in relation to the Church and to all humanity goes still further. "In a wholly singular way she cooperated by her obedience, faith, hope, and burning charity in the Savior's work of restoring supernatural life to souls. For this reason she is a mother to us in the order of grace." "This motherhood of Mary in the order of grace continues uninterruptedly from the consent which she loyally gave at the Annunciation and which she sustained without wavering beneath the cross, until the eternal fulfillment of all the elect. Taken up to heaven she did not lay aside this saving office but by her manifold intercession continues to bring us the gifts of eternal salvation Therefore the Blessed Virgin is invoked in the Church under the titles of Advocate, Helper, Benefactress, and Mediatrix."

"Mary's function as mother of men in no way obscures or diminishes this unique mediation of Christ, but rather shows its power. But the Blessed Virgin's salutary influence on men . . . flows forth from the superabundance of the merits of Christ, rests on his mediation, depends entirely on it, and draws all its power from it."51

"No creature could ever be counted along with the Incarnate Word and Redeemer; but just as the priesthood of Christ is shared in various ways both by his ministers and the faithful, and as the one goodness of God is radiated in different ways among his creatures, so also the unique mediation of the Redeemer does not exclude but rather gives rise to a manifold cooperation which is but a sharing in this one source. .

Gospel Reflection:



These encouraging words sent by St Paul, the Philippians could have been applied since the beginning of humanity. After Adam's fall, God immediately promised his help by announcing the war that had to take place between the serpent, (the devil and his followers) and the Woman and her Offspring, assuring him that she and her offspring will crash his head. This pledge was renewed several times by the prophetic words of his messengers, throughout the innumerable years preceding the Incarnation of Our Lord Jesus Christ.

"Rejoice in the Lord always, again I say, rejoice. Indeed, the Lord in near"

These announcements filled humanity with courage and hope.

What Almighty God promised throughout the old centuries was continually renewed by our Holy Mother Church, since our redemption by our Lord Jesus Christ, and will be repeated until the end of time, when those of Good will be rewarded and the Bad will be rejected. The expectation of this big event is reminded to us by the Church each year by what we call,

In a particular way, in Advent, the Church invites us to "rejoice" because as St. Paul has said, "The Lord is very near". However it depends from us whether we see him or feel his presence among us or not. St Paul continues,

"The jar of meal shall not be spent, and the cruise of oil shall not be emptied". "There is no need to worry; but if there is anything you need, pray for it, asking God for it with prayers and thanksgivings, that peace of God, which is so much greater than we can understand, will guard your hearts and your thoughts." (Phil.4:5-7)

God is merciful and his mercy is without limits. St. Matthew tells us that, large crowds went to Jesus, "bringing the lame, the crippled, the blind, the dumb and many others; these they put down at his feet, and he cured them" (Mat.15:29). After that, Jesus, feeling sorry for those people, that, "They may collapse on their way" he fed that big crowd with seven loafs and a few fish. Jesus performed so many miracles to help suffering people, even raising from death to life. He also showed God's mercy by parables like that of the prodigal son, the lost sheep, the pardoned debtor. Apart from this, Jesus had particular love for the sinners, to help them reconcile themselves with the Father. When he was criticized by the Pharisees his reply was, "It is not those who are well who need the physician, but those who are sick" (Mat.9:12) Finally God's extraordinary and unbelievable love and mercy towards us was shown at his Last Supper with the Apostles before his passion and death on the Cross, by instituting Priesthood and the Holy Eucharist to keep his presence among us until

Jubilee for Pilgrimage Workers and Supporters

This international meeting of parish priests, shrine/sanctuary rectors and personnel, and all involved in pilgrimages, is to be held in Rome on January 19-21, 2016.
The conferences are entitled:

"Pilgrims in the Footsteps of Jesus:-The Shrine as an Experience of Mercy and From the Shrine to the Parish: The Pilgrimage as an Integral Part of Pastoral Work in Parishes.

These conferences will be given in various churches of Rome according to language groups (Italian, Spanish, French, and English). There will also be catecheses given in those four languages on the theme of mercy.

On the final morning of the gathering, participants will make their pilgrimage through the Holy Door of St. Peter's Basilica and will then arrive at the Paul VI Hall, in the Vatican City State, for an audience with the Holy Father.

The selection of this international gathering as the first major event of the Holy Year will symbolically serve to highlight that this Jubilee of Mercy is a true pilgrimage and should be lived as such by all..

'I KNEW IN THAT INSTANT' An Inspirational story of the Eucharist

Another Mass, another Host, and another Sunday of wondering, "Am I the only one who receives Communion, but questions the Real Presence?" Then I felt the guilt. Oh, the guilt. I am

one to embrace guilt. I felt guilty about being a good mother, guilty about being a good wife, and guilty about being a good Catholic.

My conversion to the Catholic faith, at the age of twenty-three, was a surprise to only one person-**me**. An ancestral history of Protestants came to a climatic end with my birth in a Catholic hospital run by the Benedictine sisters. After I was born, a loving priest made the sign of the cross over my mother's bulging tummy and declared, "She will be a wonderful Catholic!"

Attending Sunday morning Mass with a classmate and her family on sleepover weekends was a special event for me. No, I did not like the 5:00 a.m. wake up call, nor the absence of breakfast, nor the stern looks when I asked "Why do you pray to statues?" However, I loved the peaceful feeling during the Mass, and the unfamiliar language made me feel like I was in the presence of God. Later on, during my confirmation process to become Catholic, I did not question my Catholic lessons, but did wonder how a piece of man-made bread could become the body and blood of Christ. As a child, when my mother was avoiding an uncomfortable question from me, she would say "Just because I said so!" I decided that I could accept the Real Presence just because the priest said so.

My guilt about questioning the Real Presence continued at each Sunday Mass, each reception of the Eucharist and every time I said a special Thank You prayer. Then, one day a new friend suggested that I ask God to show me the truth of the Real Presence. Wow! Why didn't I think of that? I knew, though, that if God did not answer my prayer, I would absorb more guilt because I would think I didn't phrase my question to Him correctly.

Little did I know that when I prayed that special prayer the following Sunday, that God would choose that day to reveal Himself to me as the body and blood of Christ in that little round wafer. As it dissolved on my tongue, I knew in that instant that He is truly real in the Blessed Eucharist, and that He wants me to receive Him daily, whenever possible. I have been transformed since that Sunday; THERE IS JOY, LOVE, AND PEACE IN MY HEART.

I'm still working on the guilt part of my life, though, because, HE SAID SO!
